

2003 Kansas City Nonprofit Sector At a Glance

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Kansas City continues to talk a lot about its nonprofit sector, its size, and how it fits into the larger economy of the metropolitan region. Again, for 2003, we are pleased to share a few summary statistics about the size and scope of the sector. This information is excerpted from a larger report that has been prepared by the research team at the Midwest Center for Nonprofit Leadership at UMKC. This information is based on latest statistics from the IRS and the National Center for Charitable Statistics. Since last year's report, based on filings with the IRS, the Kansas City nonprofit sector has experienced a small amount of growth in number of organizations and more significant growth in total revenues and assets. The number of registered 501(c)3 organizations in the metropolitan area has increased to 6,871 (a change of 36 organizations). Only about one-third of these charitable organizations, or 2267 of them, need to file annual tax returns with the IRS (because they have revenues of more than \$25,000 per year).

The Nonprofit Share of the Kansas City Economy

- The nonprofit sector comprises 2.8 percent of the number of organizations in Kansas City, yet the sector generates about 6.8 percent of total income or revenue for the region's economy (see figure 1 below). Its economic activity comprises nearly 17 percent of the Gross Metropolitan Product!

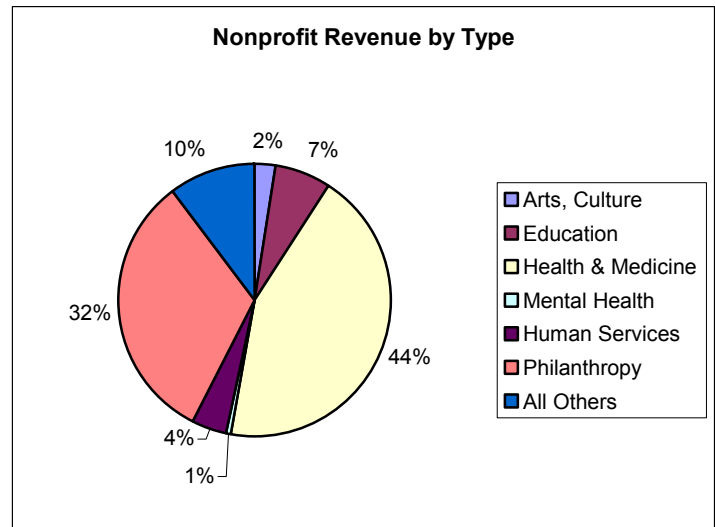
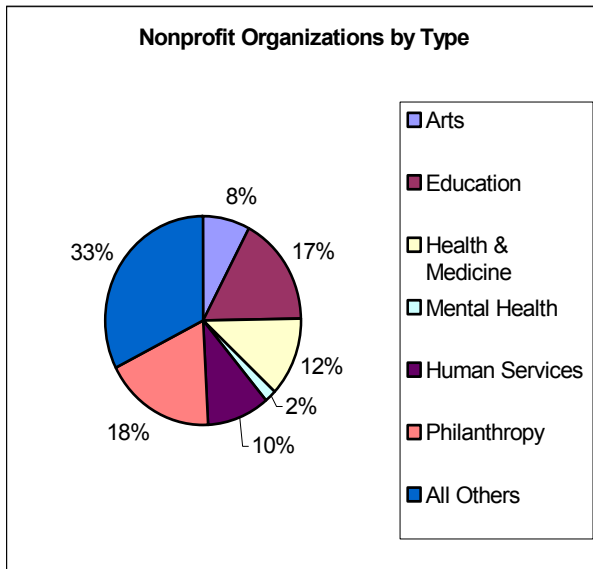
How the Number of Kansas City Nonprofits Compares With Other Metropolitan Areas

- Kansas City has an average number of nonprofits for a region its size. Compared to other metro regions, our nonprofit sector tends to fall near the middle in most categories (see Figure 2 below).

Nonprofit Categories and Market Share

- The charts below illustrate the program foci of nonprofits in Kansas City. In addition to the organizations reported below, there are more than 2,200 religious congregations (churches, synagogues, temples, etc.) in the Kansas City metro area (this information based on reports from Spirit of Service). National trends in private giving suggest that the religious congregations (which are about half of all large nonprofits in the region) receive about 57% of gifts made by individuals.



Foundations and Philanthropy

- About 25% of all foundations in Missouri and Kansas are based in the Kansas City metro area, and these foundations hold about 53% of all foundation assets and distribute about 46% of all grants.
